St John and James Mock Election Decided by only 5 Votes!

We held our own version of the election on polling day. Children representing the four main parties had been canvassing hard after studying the different party manifestos and highlighting key important elements that mattered to them. The NHS, housing and environmental issues were high on the agenda, not to mention a number of policies affecting school like holiday child-care, university fees and the scrapping of SATs.

The ballot box was full by 2pm and once the votes had been counted carefully, Labour triumphed by 86 votes to The Greens 81. The Conservatives got 32 votes and the Liberal Democrats 12.

The pupils were able to draw the London skyline from the east and west side of the river. This was in preparation to become architects and create their own building. Pupils used inspiration from the iconic London landmarks, such as the Shard, the Gherkin and the Tower of London to create their own building using the computer program 'Sketch Up' their designs will be printed using the 3D printer.

The program 'Sketch Up' is free to download if anyone would like to try and make 3D models on the computer at home.

Did you know?

Towerbridge took 8 Years to build. 30,000 tones of stone were used. It cost £1,184,000 to build. 10 men died during its construction. The walkways are 42 meters above the Thames. The bridge is 125 years old. The bridge has been repainted 7 times.

The last repaint required 22,000 litres of paint.

<u>Safer</u> Relationships

On Thursday 12th Year 6 met with PC Louise to discuss relationships and online messages. We found out that anyone aged 10 or above is legally responsible and therefore can be arrested.

We talked about the dangers of sharing inappropriate photographs and how this can have a serious effect on us, as once something is on the internet it is there forever! The children were eager to ask lots of questions so that they are well informed.
