Last week we learned about King Henry VIII.


Do you remember how many wives he had?

You need algorithms in a computer game. Algorithms will set the rules for the game and how we can win prizes or lose points.



<u>Try making your own instruments!</u>

Maracas

You will need:

- 2 empty plastic water bottles with lids
- 2 cardboard tubes
- Electrical tape
- Small items to make the sound, such as pebbles, birdseed, rice, beans, small beads, etc.

Instructions

- Pour your chosen 'noisy' items into each water bottle. If you choose two different resources for each bottle, you will get slightly different sounds.
- Test how the bottles sound by shaking each one. Screw the lids on tightly.
- Carefully, cut each cardboard tube straight down its length.
- Roll the tube in on itself to make a tight handle for your maracas.
- 5. Tape this handle on to your bottle (lid end).
- Tape the cardboard tube all the way along its length to ensure a strong handle.

Castanets

You will need: • 4 plastic milk

bottle tops

Strong corrugated

card

• Glue


Instructions

- Cut two long rectangles out of the cardboard and fold them in half. Cut each end into a curved shape.
- Glue a bottle top on the inside of each end so that when the carboard is squeezed together, the bottle tops make a clicking (castanet) sound.
- 3. Decorate as desired.
