Crisis is a charity that helps those who find themselves homeless. They help people to get support quickly.



The children have already learned the 3Rs, Ready, Respectful and Responsible and are beginning to understand what they mean.




Parent Survey - September 2021

My child is happy at this school.





Code of Conduct - the three Rs

Ready

- 1. Be punctual.
- 2. Be in full school uniform.
- 3. Be silent when entering a classroom.
- 4. Listen carefully.
- 5. All necessary equipment out, and everything else away.

Respectful

- 6. Do as you are asked by all members of staff, first time without question.
- 7. Listen to others, do not call out, and use appropriate language and tone.
- 8. Be kind to each other and take care of property.

Responsible

- 9. Follow rules for health and safety.
- 10. Keep hands, feet, objects and personal comments to yourself.
- 11. Be in the right place at the right time, and not in unsupervised areas.

The children have really embraced the new code of conduct and behaviour and attitudes this term have been phenomenal.

Thank you for all of your support with implementing the behaviour expectations. Remember to use the 3Rs when discussing incidents with your children at home!






In science, we learn about Animals, including humans, focusing on healthy living by looking into the food groups and how what we eat affects our bodies. For example, dairy foods will give us the calcium necessary for strong bones and teeth. Or the carbohydrates foods, such as rice, grains, pasta, gives us energy.










The children are focussing on number and place value at the moment. Being able to read and write increasingly bigger numbers is essential to moving on to calculation. We use practical manipulatives to help children to develop their understanding of the different digits.

Times tables are an essential part of life, we use them everyday. By the end of year 4, all children should be able to recall and use times table facts up to 12 x 12, these are built up over time.

Times tables activities will be added to Mathletics and Google Classroom weekly for homework.

If you are struggling to access online platforms please speak to us. Homework is an crucial part of your children's independence, development and education; good habits are formed now.
